I have been working in Havana for the past 25 years and for the last 10 as cofounder + executive director of The Horns Project / Horns to Havana. Our instrument repair program, individual instrument donation program, and our teaching programs and educational scholarships fill my heart - especially now with their amazing successes.

## & Its Magic At Work

Susan Sillins & Catherine Murphy, Co-Founders of Horns to Havana, Reminisce As The Organization Begins Its 10th Year Celebration





**The Beginning.** I remember we had just returned from Havana and a few weeks later, I saw you, Eric and Diane at Jazz at Lincoln Center when we went to hear Chucho (Valdés) perform. We started talking about how great it would be to create something that could help the music students we had just seen in Havana. Something that could help them develop long term and give them more access to jazz. We planned for almost a year and put together the fundraiser at Guantanamera so we could bring instruments and artisans down to Cuba in 2011 and that was the beginning of everything. **(Susan)** 

**The Magnitude & The Magic.** And now 10 years later, it's pretty incredible to think about the magnitude – that we have fixed 7000 instruments and donated over 500. Horns has been changing the lives of so many students but also the lives of their families and professors and of us. I'm consistently overjoyed by the surprises of our musical community. We are making global citizens through music. *(Catherine)* 

**And Family.** I think of seeing Rodrigo 10 years ago and now seeing him perform as a leader of his own band. And Pepe and Enrique and all of the great people who kept joining our Horns family and brought new opportunities to grow our program. Just magical really, how deep the connections were before Horns came to life and how much deeper they have grown now. We have fallen in love with so many people. **(Susan)** 

Music Is A Language. Horns really has confirmed that music is our common language and a bridge in the world that makes so much possible. We have flown students from Havana to New York City and New Orleans and San Francisco for concerts and classes and cultural exchanges. Most had never been on a plane and didn't speak any English, yet it never failed that we all connected. In New Orleans we gave instruments to students and made them cry from happiness. The instrument is everything, the pathway. (Susan)

And let's not forget Common coming to Havana and speaking to our students! That was pretty incredible! *(Catherine)*

We had a makeshift taller at La Ena school the first year I traveled with Horns to Havana. Customs did not allow any of our tools to be released until two days before we were supposed to leave, so we ended up working with the few personal tools we had put in our suitcases like a pocket knife! We made work benches out of abandoned doors that we rested on sawhorses. We had to go to the principal's office just like the students to get water or use the restroom. That first trip was exhilarating and fun and made us realize how inventive Cubans are, and we could be too. We had so much fun that we insisted on returning for nine more years and hope to do so again very soon. The shop has made over 7000 repairs by now. Happy 10 years, Horns to Havana – what an incredible journey!

## Los Hermanos/The Brothers Premiere Celebrated In Havana



Filmmaker friends Marcia Jarmel + Ken Schneider had their premiere of **Los Hermanos/The Brothers**, a joyous celebration of family, music, and what can happen when borders can be crossed. Nominated for *Best Music Documentary* by the International Documentary Association, the film just premiered internationally at the Havana Film Festival at the Yara Theater.
